The Kwinana Heritage Group is made up of passionate volunteers who have cared for the Smirk's Heritage Site for over 25 years.

The foundational purpose of the group is to preserve and promote awareness of Kwinana's Heritage.

Over time the group has managed other heritage sites, saved buildings from demolition, successfully secured a museum space and delivered activities in and around Kwinana.

The Kwinana Heritage Group members meet on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 8.00am until 11.30am.

A variety of jobs are undertaken including gardening, repairs & maintenance, cleaning and rearranging displays, and preserving and recording the historical collection.

Visitors are welcome during this time and at our Open Days on the first Sunday of the month from 10.00am to 3.00pm.

Kwinana Heritage Group is registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC).

Our Purpose

The purpose of Kwinana Heritage Group is to preserve and maintain the collection of heritage items and buildings at the Smirk's Heritage Site and to promote awareness of the heritage value of the site and artefacts to the local community, local and state education providers and other interested groups throughout Western Australia.

Smirk's Heritage Site is a collection of buildings and spaces which showcase the regions settlement history through to the development of Kwinana as a town.

The focus of the site is Smirk's Cottage, a heritage building surrounded by beautiful gardens, a museum, a settlement house, machinery shed, blacksmith shop and repair shed.

A local history collection is managed by the group on site.

Achieving Our Purpose

Our dedicated group of volunteers spend many hours maintaining the Smirks Heritage Site, its contents and artefacts and documenting the collection.

This involves:

<u>Grounds and gardens</u>: We keep our lawns and gardens in immaculate condition by mowing lawns, trimming trees, lawn edging, weeding, planting new shrubs, fertilising, reticulation maintenance.

<u>Cottages, outbuildings, museum, alfresco areas</u>: Regular cleaning of the cottages and other areas, ongoing maintenance of the buildings, workshops and tool sheds.

<u>Museum and cottage contents</u>: Preserving, cleaning and documenting all furniture, displays and artefacts within these buildings.

<u>Promoting our heritage</u>: We have an Open Day on the first Sunday of each month from 10am to 3pm where the public can enjoy the tranquillity of the site, view the cottages and displays in the Museum and throughout the site, and learn about Kwinana's history. We also encourage clubs, groups and schools to visit us and have had many local school visits, the Alzheimer's Group, the Umbrella Multicultural Community Care Services, support groups, and various clubs.

Historian's Report

Accessions

Over one hundred items were accessioned in the year including both long-term and recent donations. The former were mainly tools and engines stored between two sheds/workshops and have now been combined in the same location to be known as the Tool & Engine Museum. Recent donations (examples below) have been diverse and have required identification and relevance to the different collections and the people of the Kwinana area.

Recent Donations

During the year we have received many donations that have added to the experience of visiting the Site and providing a visual history of the area.

One of the main items has been the diorama of the rail/tram-line built to clear the timber at the start of the Soldier/Group Settlement in the area. It is a close replica of the route with a working model train which catches the imagination of the public.



We have also received domestic and industrial items found and/or used in the local area.





Facebook

Each week photos and text are posted on our two Facebook pages (Kwinana Heritage & Kwinana Heritage Group) to keep people aware of what is happening on site and to advertise our Open Days and upcoming events. An attempt has been made to vary the entries to cater for the interests of the nearly 5,000 followers, and the extended reach of being able to post on other Facebook sites to over 100,000 viewers.

Heritage Research Visits

In August members visited the Azelia Ley Museum Homestead and Wagonhouse, Hamilton Hill and the Army Museum of WA Fremantle. In each case we observed features to use on site, talked to fellow volunteers, and shared the knowledge to those who were unable to attend.







Future & Existing Projects

The opening of the Tool & Engine Museum (T&E Museum) is the largest of the new projects. We hope to have it officially opened early in 2025. The Museum is an adjunct to the existing Kwinana Museum, the two existing Heritage-listed cottages, and the other displays.





The preservation of the existing collections is ongoing. We are also removing items no longer relevant to the premise of relevance to Kwinana and/or damaged beyond repair due to mould or exposure to the elements.

TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT

July 1 2023 to June 30 2024

1. INTRODUCTION:

Our 2023-24 Annual Financial Reports were completed and presented to Peacock Accounting for Audit in early July so that the Audit would be available for the Annual General Meeting.

In the Auditor's opinion our statements reflected fairly the financial position of the Kwinana Heritage Group Inc. A copy of the Audit Report is on the notice board.

We ended the financial year positively with a profit of \$6,910, thanks mainly to the Auction fund-raiser and those who worked so hard to make it a success.

2. CITY OF KWINANA OPERATING SUBSIDY:

While there were some delays in receiving the Subsidy payments due to a new Services Funding Agreement replacing the old Management Agreement the full subsidy was received by the end of the financial year. Subsidy payments are now made 6-monthly rather than quarterly and are still subject to the Group achieving the required KPIs in the agreement.

3. ACCOUNT BALANCES:

The Kwinana Heritage Group Inc account balances at 30 June 2024 were:

4. PROFIT & LOSS:

Our Profit and Loss report for the year shows an income of \$19,918.78 and expenses of \$13,008.47, resulting in a profit of \$6,910.31.

Our main income was \$10,000 from the City of Kwinana's Operating Subsidy, \$5,500 from a very successful auction, \$1,817 in donations (up 24% from last year) and \$385 in memberships.

Our main expenses were \$3,300 for new alfresco blinds, \$1,452 for garden and general maintenance, \$1,379 insurance, \$1,468 internet & phone and \$645 for member catering. Copies of all reports are available from the Treasurer if required.

5. UPCOMING:

The Group is currently seeking approval to construct a cover over the outdoor machinery. No quotes have been provided yet but if approved it will probably need to be paid for from our reserve funds.

I'm not aware of any other significant projects planned for the 2024-25 financial year. To assist with forward budgeting details of any such projects or proposed spending should be provided to the Treasurer.

6. SUMMARY:

Generally a successful year financially, mainly due to the auction fund-raiser, donations and well-managed spending. Any additional funding ideas could help us repeat that result this year.

We all need to keep a focus on the KPIs in the Services Funding Agreement so that we can receive the funding as soon as possible and not just at the end of each 6-month period.

Forward planning

- One of our main projects being considered is to erect a cover over our farming machinery. The machinery is currently deteriorating due to being uncovered and out in the weather. Issues such as cost, feasibility, design and City participation are currently being investigated.
- Ongoing action to rectify the damp and mould issues in both Soldiers and Smirks cottages is a top priority. Dehumidifiers are helping reduce some of the damp but more work is required to seal both cottages from rainwater and water absorption through the walls.
- More storage cupboards for archiving files and documents and the protection of artefacts.
